


Historical Female Legends








DOROTHY HODGKIN (1910-1994)

Dorothy Hodgkin was a British biochemist who had to fight her way into a chemistry class was only for boys. Because she was a woman she was not taken seriously by fellow classmates or faculty. Later she pursued to structure penicillin, insulin and the vitamin B-12 and the methods of X-ray crystallography.



Women are not nearly recognized enough or seen as the most powerful people in the world. 

One Google search for the word "bossy" reveals its associations with women, with femininity. As you can see, both of the example uses in sentences refer to girls; and not just any girls; fearless, feckful sisters of brothers. Additionally, the term refers to a "cow or calf"; what do you know, another word used as an insult for women. And notice that the listed antonym of "bossy" is "submissive". Hmm, where does this come up? Oh yes, the main thing women and girls are taught to be;



submissive. And look at when its use increased; perhaps in line with conservative backlash against 2nd wave feminism.

"Bossy" is a word that almost no one would imagine using for a man or boy, yet it seems that most women have been called "bossy" as little girls. We can't all be control freaks, can we? I don't think so. "Bossy" has been substituted for "stubborn", "free", "opinionated", "assertive", "organized", and "being a leader"; coincidentally, the exact traits that patriarchy would like to see eliminated in women and girls. Girls are rarely complemented for their leadership; rather, gifted young girls are shut down for "bossiness" which is actually simply taking an active role in leadership in the vast majority of cases.

I say we put an end to that. Call things for what they really are. Before you use the term "bossy", think; is this individual showing an excess of commanding or demanding things from others, or an aptitude for respectfully organizing and leading of even just a lack of passivity? In any case, "bossy" is the wrong word. Try "excessively controlling/demanding" or "a leader" or "powerful". I would argue that "bossy" as a phenomenon simply doesn't exist and should not be legitimized as such by use of the term.

Critique of female leadership: The Kardashian era By Emily Rose


